## **Entry requirements**

Learners must have 5 GCSE's grade C or above, including Maths & English and complete a successful interview, DBS check and health record to be accepted onto the programme using the standard College procedure.

## Interview: Prospective students will be interviewed at QEII High School in September 2016.

Please note that we are unable to enter into further discussion or correspondence about individual cases where an applicant has been unsuccessful. Due to a limited number of places, there are no guarantees that all students will be accepted onto the programme.

Progression: This qualification is equivalent to one A level grade A\* -E and UCAS points ranging from 140 - 40. Students who study this qualification alongside other A level subjects may consider Higher Education within the health, social care or education sectors.

Course structure: There are 3 mandatory units (30 credits) plus optional units to fulfil the extra 30 credits required. Methods of assessment: Assignments which could include role play, written work, presentations, discussion, placement activities and controlled assessment. Scenarios provide a vocational context.

## Units to be studied

- Unit 1-Developing Effective Communication in Health and Social Care-understanding effective communication, the barriers that may exist and ways to overcome these with an opportunity to gain the interpersonal skills needed to work in H&SC sector.
- Unit 2—Equality Diversity and Rights—understanding of concepts relating to equality, diversity and rights in H&SC including discriminatory practice and means of combating this and how national initiatives promote anti-discriminatory practice.
- Unit 3- Health, Safety and Security in Health and Social Care -understanding the importance of health, safety and security of individuals in a health and social care context. Exploring legislation, policies and procedures, the purpose of risk analysis and how to deal with incidents and emergencies.
- Unit 4—Development through the Life Stages— gain knowledge and understanding of the different stages throughout the human lifespan including the physical and psychological changes of ageing and application of theories of ageing to H&SC
- Unit 5—Anatomy and Physiology for Health and Social Care overview the organisation of the human body, how the body systems work together to provide energy and investigate how homeostatic mechanisms operate in the body.
- Unit 48-Exploring Personal and Professional Development in Health and Social Care-understanding different ways in which learning can take place and how learning from experience can be used to enhance the quality of knowledge, skills & practice. A minimum of 50 hours work experience is required and provides an opportunity to relate theory to practice and reflect on experiences.
